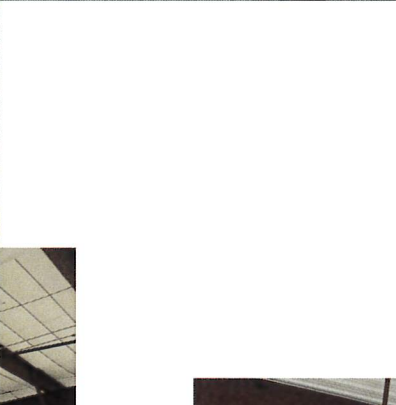

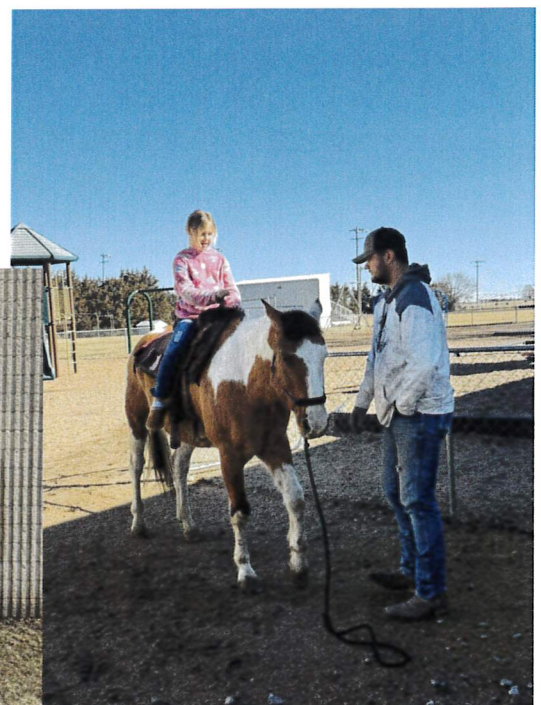
CDE Results:

Bruning -Davenport Students Attend 2026 State Peer Education Conference

Kearney, Neb. — A total of 285 students and advisers representing 45 chapters from across Nebraska gathered in Kearney on February 23, 2026 for the 2026 State Peer Education Conference. The conference theme “*Grow Bold, Live Gold*” highlighted student leadership, service, and personal growth through peer education.

This year, the State Peer Officer Teams are focusing on the national program areas of Families First and Student Body, encouraging chapters to strengthen family relationships and promote healthy lifestyles within their schools and communities.

Chapters also participated in the Capture the Action awards, which recognize outstanding projects aligned with the Families First and Student Body national programs. BD Students were recognized for their Families First project: A Quilt to Valor made by Aliviah Barney and Josie Stanek. The Student Body Project: **M.I.L.K.** (Measuring & Investing Love for Kids) raised funds to provide milk for a year at the local non-profit daycare.

The conference featured several educational sessions and guest speakers. The keynote speaker, Trooper Tim Flick of the Nebraska State Patrol, addressed the topic of human trafficking, sharing valuable information about awareness, prevention, and response. In a breakout session, Trooper Flick further discussed how to respectfully support and interact with survivors without re-traumatizing them.

Additional breakout sessions included a presentation by Team Nutrition on the nutritional value and versatility of dry beans as part of healthy eating initiatives. Hannah Mayo of Creighton, Nebraska presented on coping skills for teens, providing practical strategies students can use to manage stress and navigate challenging situations.

Attending from the Bruning-Davenport FCCLA chapter were: Josie Stanek, Aliviah Barney, Claire Lahners, Paisley Follmer, Myla Schoenholz, and Lori Balke- Advisor.

The State Peer Education Conference continues to provide Nebraska students with meaningful opportunities to develop leadership skills, promote wellness, and make a positive impact in their schools and communities through Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA).



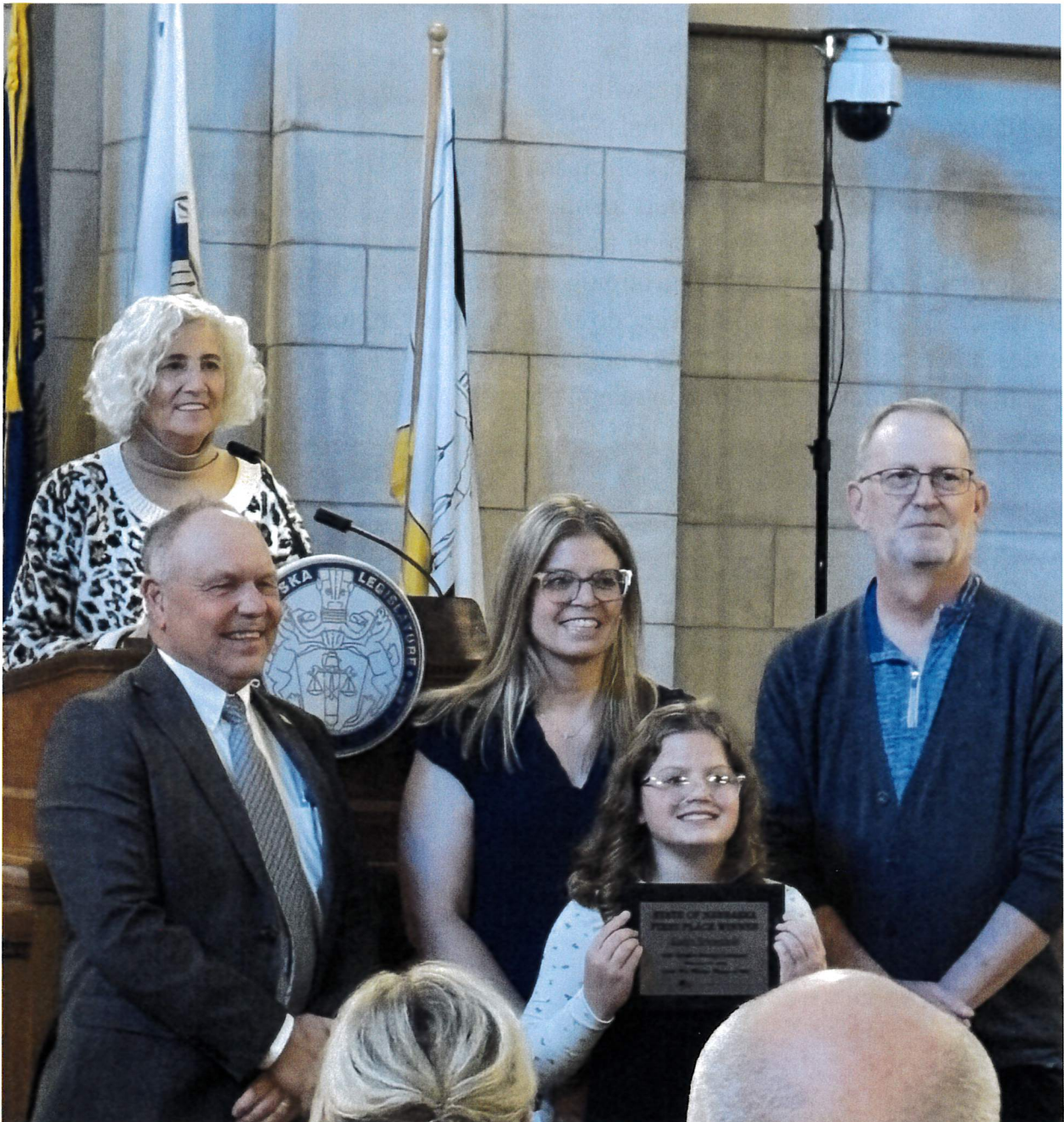

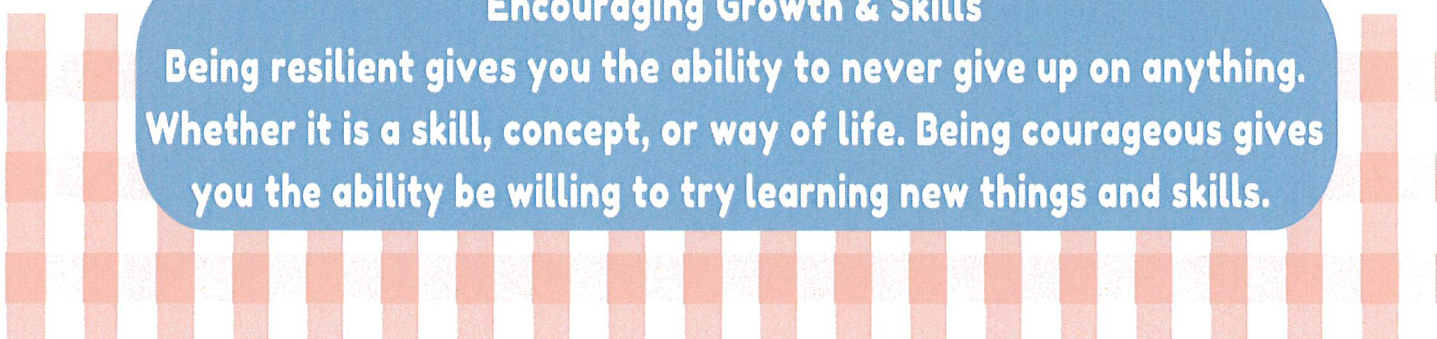

Pursuant to laws and notices posted at Bruning-Davenport Schools, Cornerstone Bank, Bruning Bank, Bruning Post Office, Davenport Post Office, and also published in The Hebron Journal Register on March 4, 2026; all proceedings were taken while the meeting was open to the public.

President Baysinger called the meeting to order at 7:30 pm. Unified members present were Sarah Krehnke, Ryan Miller, Aaron Oltmans, and Brad Williams. Local board members present were Baxter Beals, Tony Norder, Ryne Philippi, Lon Schoenholz, and Derek Shaner. Also present were Principal Ruth Kowalski, Erika Brinegar, Lori Balke, and Cammie Freitag. Jack Moles and Paul Sheffield arrived at 8:15 PM.

Baysinger welcomed all guests, recognized the Open Meetings Act, and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Sarah Krehnke moved, seconded by Brad Williams, to approve the absence of Unified member Trey Strong. (Roll Call 5-0)

The Consent Agenda included the agenda, minutes of the February 9, 2026, Unified Board meeting, Treasurer's Report, and the March claims. Krehnke moved, seconded by Aaron Oltmans, to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. Roll Call Vote (5-0)

Principal Kowalski's report – strong improvement on the high schoolers' MAP testing scores – elementary went to the Edgerton Explorit Center in Aurora – Prom is April 11 in Davenport – Speech team has districts on March 16th at Raymond Central – State is March 28 – State FFA is March 25-27 and State FCCLA is March 29-31 – Character Strong classes having been working on their community involvement and are currently doing a canned food drive from March 9-March 16 – Track and golf have begun
